
Places of interest to visit while in Dublin











Kilmainham Gaol. <u>Kilmainham Gaol Museum | A monument to more than a century of Irish nationalism</u> one of Dublin's premier visitor attractions. Gives a great history of Ireland's fight for freedom. The guides are really excellent. Booking in advance is advisable.

Guinness Storehouse <u>Guinness Storehouse</u>: <u>Visit The Home of Guinness | Guinness | IE</u> Visit the home of Guinness and enjoy a pint in the gravity bar overlooking the city afterwards. This is a self-guided tour.

National Museum of Ireland: <u>Welcome to the National Museum of Ireland</u> Learn about Ireland's history, heritage and culture through a priceless collection of artefacts. Entry is free.

National Gallery of Ireland <u>Home | National Gallery of Ireland</u> Collection features some of the world's greatest artists, such as Picasso, Monet and Jack B Yeats. Entry is free.

Little Museum of Dublin <u>Dublin's Best Museum Experience | The Little Museum of Dublin</u> Explore the quirky side of Dublin by visiting their unique collection, which includes, a piece of Nelson's pillar, pictures of the Contraceptive train from 1971 and a collection of U2 memorabilia.

Croke Park tour. <u>Discover, Experience and Explore Croke Park</u>
Discover the history of the GAA and view the city from the skyline tour, which takes you along the perimeter of the top of the stadium.

Christ Church Cathedral Home | Christ Church Cathedral Visit the almost 1000 year old Cathedral to see its beautiful architecture and unique stained glass windows and learn about the history of the Church of Ireland.

Book of Kells <u>Book of Kells Experience</u> | <u>Trinity College Dublin</u> | <u>Official Site</u> Explore Trinity's Old Library and view the world-famous Book of Kells. Learn about the symbolism and artistry of the 1,200-year-old manuscript and get a close-up look at the current pages on display. Trinity also lovely campus to explore.

Irish Tenement Museum 14 Henrietta Street | Award-winning Dublin museum is Dublin's tenement museum. You can experience 300 years of city living in one house. Visits are by guided tour only, so you must book in advance.
